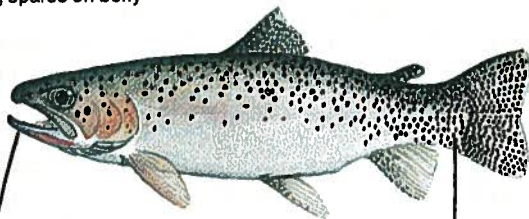
## CUTTHROAT TROUT

Cutthroat trout are the only members of the genus *Oncorhynchus* native to most of Montana. The number and range of both subspecies have been severely reduced over the years due to habitat destruction, competition, interbreeding with other species, and over fishing.

Cutthroat trout can grow to a fairly large size (1-3 lbs.) and provide excellent fishing in good habitat if they are not over harvested. Because they take a hook so readily, cutthroat can be over fished more easily than any other western trout. If you fish anywhere cutthroat are found, but particularly in streams, we ask that you check the throat area of fish you catch for red slashes. Letting those fish go should contribute to improve fishing. Enjoy the recreation these native Montanans can provide.

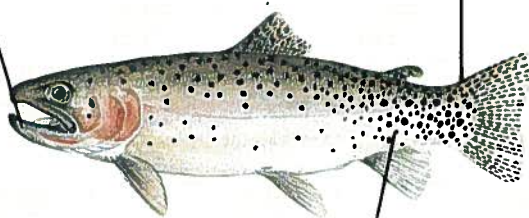

## GENERAL REGULATIONS

The Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks receives federal aid. Under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the federal government prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, or handicap. Anyone believing they have been discriminated against in any program, activity or facility as described above, or desiring further information, may write to: Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, 1420 East Sixth Avenue, Helena, MT 59620; or Office of Equal Opportunity, U.S. Department of Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240.

By order of the Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission, the seasons, limits and regulations listed herein shall govern the 1994 fishing season. These regulations are valid March 1, 1994, through February 28, 1995. These regulations were adopted by the Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission on November 5, 1993.

\*These regulations as adopted herein are also proposed to remain in effect for the 1995 fishing season. They will be formally adopted, with possible changes, by the Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission in the winter of 1994. Any changes will be made available to the public on an addendum sheet available from all license agents and at all Fish, Wildlife and Parks' offices. Portions of the regulations in this booklet may be changed, or additions may be made, for the 1995 fishing season. In order to have a complete set of the current regulations and in order to remain in compliance with the law, anglers must obtain the fishing regulations addendum sheet.

## License Requirements

A fishing license is a permit for the lawful holder thereof to fish for and possess any fish within the state as authorized by fishing regulations. This includes commercial whitefishing in which case the license must be validated by an authorized Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks employee. There is no charge for this validation.

A conservation license is required of both residents and non-residents before a fishing license may be purchased.

Licenses are nontransferable and nonrefundable. The license year runs March 1 through February of the following year.

### Resident

In order to apply for a Montana resident fishing (or hunting) license, one must be a legal resident of Montana for a period of six months immediately prior to making application.

Each resident 15 years of age and older must have a resident fishing license in order to fish. Residents 12 through 14 years of age and residents 62 and older must have a conservation license to fish. Residents under the age of 12 need no license to fish but must observe limits and all other fishing regulations.

Free fishing permits are available from heads of respective institutions for patients at veteran's administration hospitals and for residents of state institutions other than the state penitentiary.

Residents who are certified as permanently and substantially disabled, as designated by rules of the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, need only to purchase a "Disabled Persons Conservation License" to fish.

## GENERAL REGULATIONS

### License Requirements, Continued . . .

- **Resident Conservation License** . . . . . \$ 4.00
  - Residents 12 through 14 years of age and residents 62 or older need only a conservation license to fish, and to hunt upland game birds, other than turkeys.
- **Resident Disabled Persons Conservation License** . . . \$ 4.00
  - Residents who are certified as permanently and substantially disabled, as designated by rules of the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks, may apply for an annual "Disabled Persons Conservation License" which authorizes fishing, and hunting of upland game birds.
- **Resident Fishing License** . . . . . \$13.00
- **Resident Sportsman's License** . . . . . \$84.00
  - Includes a conservation, deer "A", and elk license and authorizes fishing, and hunting of upland game birds, other than turkeys.
- **Resident Paddlefish Tags** . . . . . Two for \$ 5.00
  - Limit of two.
  - Required of all paddlefish anglers, regardless of age.

### Nonresident Licensing

All nonresidents 15 years of age and older must have a fishing license to fish. No nonresident under the age of 15 years may fish in Montana without having obtained a fishing license unless the nonresident under the age of 15 years is in the company of an adult in possession of a valid Montana fishing license. The limit of fish for the nonresident and the accompanying adult combined may not exceed the limit for one adult.

A nonresident of any age may purchase a nonresident fishing license and be entitled to take a legal limit of fish.

- **Nonresident Conservation License** . . . . . \$ 5.00
- **Nonresident Season Fishing License** . . . . . \$ 45.00
- **Nonresident 2-Day Fishing License** . . . . . \$ 10.00
  - Valid for 2 consecutive days.
- **Nonresident Paddlefish Tag** . . . . . Two for \$ 15.00
  - Limit of two.
  - Required for all nonresident paddlefish anglers, regardless of age, even when accompanied by an adult in possession of a valid Montana fishing license.
- **Nonresident Deer Combination License** . . . . . \$245.00
  - Available from the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks Helena Headquarters only. Includes a conservation and deer "A" license and authorizes fishing, and hunting of upland game birds, other than turkeys. Quota of 6,000.
- **Nonresident Big Game Combination License** . . . . \$475.00
  - Available from the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks Helena headquarters only. Includes a conservation, deer "A", and elk license and authorizes fishing, and hunting of upland game birds, other than turkeys. Quota of 17,000.

### State Park Entrance Fee—Resident & Nonresident

Montana state park use, including fishing from waters at a state park, requires an entrance fee. A state park passport vehicle sticker is available for \$15 from any Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office and most license agents. For the occasional user, a \$3 per vehicle daily entrance charge may be paid at the site you are visiting.

## Statewide Standard Fishing Regulations

### Limits — Daily and Possession

- **Daily limit** shall mean the numbers of fish that may be legally taken during a calendar day. It is unlawful to take or possess more than the daily limit of fish unless otherwise specified under district regulations.
- **Possession limit** shall mean the number of fish which may be in one person's possession anytime in any form: fresh, stored in freezers or lockers, salted, smoked, dried, canned or otherwise preserved.
  - Refer to district regulations for respective daily and possession limits.
  - A person fishing on a water may possess only the limit allowed for that water.
  - Where size limits apply and while a person is on the water and fishing, all fish in possession must be whole with head, skin, and fins attached. Only gills and entrails may be removed.
  - Fish may be dressed and filleted before transport to a permanent residence, but the skin must remain attached to each fillet. It is unlawful to transport dressed fish to a person's residence unless those fish can be counted. If the catch is frozen prior to transportation, each fish or fillet must be packaged so it can be counted. Two filets will be counted as one fish.
  - It is illegal to can fish before taking them to a permanent residence. Mobile recreational vehicles, travel trailers, or tents do not qualify as permanent residences.

### Seasons

All dates given are inclusive dates. Where dates specify an open season, fishing is closed throughout the remainder of the year. An open season is for all species unless otherwise specified.

### Game Fish

All species of the family Salmonidae (chars, trout, salmon, grayling and whitefish); all species of the genus *Stizostedion* (sauger and walleye); all species of the genus *Esox* (northern pike and tiger muskellunge); all species of the genus *Micropterus* (bass); all species of the genus *Polyodon* (paddlefish); all species of the family Acipenseridae (sturgeon); the genus *Lota* (burbot or ling); and the species *Ictalurus punctatus* (channel catfish).

### Fishing Hours

Fishing is allowed at all hours during open fishing seasons.

### Fishing Methods

#### Hook and Line Limits

- Only a single line with up to two hooks, with or without a pole, may be used for fishing unless otherwise specified in district regulations. The pole or line must be hand-held or in immediate control.
- Where multiple lines are allowed, the total number of allowable lines includes hand-held lines, setlines, spears, or other units of fishing gear.
- Hook—A hook is a single, double, or treble point attached to a single shank. A lure with multiple hooks is still considered a single hook.
- These provisions also apply to commercial whitefish fishing as provided under district regulations.

#### Setlines

- Setlines may be used on some waters as specified by district regulations. Unless otherwise specified a setline must be checked by the owner at least once every 24 hours.
- The owner's name and address must be attached to each unattended setline.
- Setlines shall not be attached to jugs or other floating devices.

#### Snagging

- Snagging of fish is unlawful at all times except paddlefish, chinook salmon, kokanee salmon and nongame fish as provided under district regulations. Where snagging is allowed, any number of hooks may be used. Snagging is a technique of angling in which a hook or hooks are cast, trolled or lowered into the water and manipulated to imbed the hook or hooks into the body of the fish. All game fish not legal for snagging that are incidentally snagged must be released immediately.

#### Nets and Traps

- Landing nets may be used for landing hooked fish.
- A screen or a net not to exceed four (4) feet in length or width may be used to take sculpins (genus *Cottus*) for bait statewide.
- In Central and Eastern District waters where use of live fish is allowed for bait, nongame species (except carp, goldfish, sunfish, bullheads (catfish family), yellow perch and rainbow smelt) may be taken in the following manner:
  - with seines not to exceed twelve (12) feet in length and four (4) feet in width, or
  - with minnow traps not to exceed eighteen (18) inches in length and ten (10) inches in diameter.
- Crayfish for personal consumption may be taken in traps not to exceed eighteen (18) inches in length and ten (10) inches in diameter.
- Hoop nets may be used in Eastern Fishing District only. See page 30.

#### Artificial Lures

- Artificial lures shall include any lure (including flies) that is man-made in imitation of or as a substitute for natural bait. Artificial lures do not include fish eggs or other chemically treated or processed natural baits or any natural or man-made food, or any man-made lures that have been treated with a natural or artificial fish attractant or feeding stimulant.

### Minnows and Other Bait

#### Live Fish

- Live fish may not be imported into or exported from the State of Montana except by a permit issued by the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.
- Sculpins (genus *Cottus*) may be used live for bait statewide, except in waters limited to artificial lures and in the Madison River between Varney Bridge and Ennis Lake.
- Live carp, goldfish, sunfish, bullheads (catfish family), yellow perch and rainbow smelt may not be used for bait at any location in the state.
- Live fish other than sculpins may not be used for bait except as provided under Bait (Live) as listed in the Central (page 18) and Eastern (page 31) District regulations.
- Persons fishing in waters closed to the use of live fish for bait may not have live bait fish in their immediate possession. Nongame species may be taken for bait only in waters where live fish are allowed as bait (see Fishing Methods, pages 3-4).

#### Dead Fish

Any fish, or parts thereof, may be used dead as bait if they have their heads and entrails removed, or if they have been preserved or frozen, except in waters limited to artificial lures only.

#### Commercial Bait Fish Seining and Sale of Bait Fish

- Nongame bait fish (except carp, goldfish, sunfish, bullhead (catfish family), yellow perch and rainbow smelt) may be harvested for commercial purposes in accordance with ARM

### Commercial Bait Fish Seining, Continued...

Section 12.7.201.-12.7.206. Any individual taking nongame fish for sale or commercial distribution must possess a commercial bait fish seining license. Contact your regional Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office for a permit and list of waters open to commercial seining.

- Live bait fish may not be imported into or exported from the State of Montana for commercial or other purposes.
- Commercial bait regulations are not valid on Indian reservation waters—for information contact local tribal officials.

### Commercial Aquatic Invertebrate Collections

Persons wishing to collect aquatic invertebrates such as leeches, crayfish, and aquatic insects for sale or commercial distribution should contact their regional Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office for information. Also see Crayfish and Mussels.

### Irrigation Canals and Ditches

Man made irrigation canals and ditches are open year around unless shown otherwise under district regulations. District standard daily and possession limits for rivers and streams apply to irrigation canals and ditches.

### Beaver Ponds

Impoundments formed by beaver dams on streams are governed by the same regulations that govern the streams.

### Closed Waters

All waters operated by the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service as fish hatcheries and rearing ponds shall be closed to fishing at all times. Water in which the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks is operating fish traps and other special structures shall be closed to fishing as posted. Certain water-supply lakes, streams, and hazardous areas are closed as posted.

### Children's Fishing Waters

Waters posted as Children's Fishing Waters are closed to fishing during the entire year to persons 12 years of age and older. Children's Fishing Waters are:

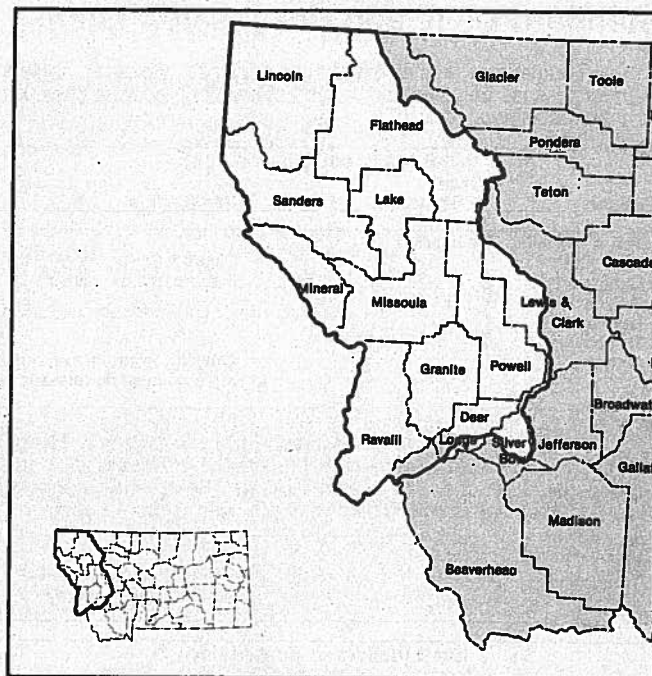

### It is Unlawful

It is unlawful and a misdemeanor

- To violate any of the regulations listed in this booklet.
- To transport or introduce any fish or viable fish eggs into any waters.
- To refuse to show one's license upon demand.
- To refuse to show one's fish upon demand.
- To loan or transfer your fishing or hunting license or tags to any person.
- To sell game fish except as prescribed by Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks Commission regulations.
- To leave or dump any dead animal, fish, garbage or litter in or on any state or private property where public recreation is permitted.
- To use any carbide, lime, giant powder, dynamite, or other explosive compounds, or any corrosive or narcotic poison or to have any of the same in one's possession within one hundred (100) feet of any stream where fish are found, for the purpose of stunning or killing fish.
- To hire or retain an unlicensed outfitter or guide.
- To waste any part of game fish suitable for food.

## Standard Fishing Seasons

**Lakes**—Open entire year. Valid fishing license required.

**Rivers and Streams**—Open third Saturday in May through November 30. Some streams have extended whitefish and catch-and-release fishing for trout from December 1 to third Saturday in May. See Special Regulations. Valid fishing license required.

**Ice Fishing**—All lakes and reservoirs in the Western District are open to use of two (2) attended lines with two (2) hooks per line when fishing through the ice. Valid fishing license required.

**Bow and Arrow**—All waters open to angling are open to bow and arrow taking of nongame fish. Crossbows are illegal. Valid fishing license required.

**Snagging**—All waters open to angling are open to snagging of nongame fish. Snagging of salmon is allowed in waters open to fishing from September 15 through December except as noted under Special Regulations. Valid fishing license required.

**Spearing**—Persons swimming or submerged may take non-game fish by spearing in most waters open to fishing (note Special Regulations). Valid fishing license required.

### Standard Daily and Possession Limits

Each angler may take all of the following limits. However, anglers may possess only the limit of fish allowed for the water on which they are fishing.

It is unlawful to take or possess any sturgeon of the genus *Acipenser* (White Sturgeon).

#### Bait

- It is illegal to use or capture live bait fish except sculpins (*Cottus*) in any waters of the Western Fishing District.
- Live fish may not be imported into or exported from the State of Montana except by permit issued by the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.

#### Boat and Motor Restrictions

The use of boats and motors may be restricted on some of the waters within this fishing district. Please refer to the boat and motor restrictions described on page 37. A complete description of all the boat and motor restrictions can be obtained by contacting a license agent or any Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office.

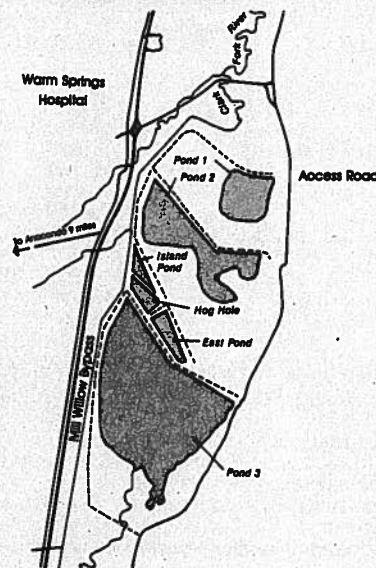
### WESTERN FISHING DISTRICT SPECIAL REGULATIONS

Check the district special regulations listed below for the body of water you intend to fish. If the body of water is not found in the listing of special regulations, the standard regulations, seasons, and daily/possession limits apply.

#### Abbot Lake near Bigfork

- Closed to spearing.
- Limit: Five (5) bass daily and in possession, only one of which may exceed 12 inches. May 15 through June 30; one bass daily and in possession, 22 inches minimum length.

#### Anaconda Settling Pond System



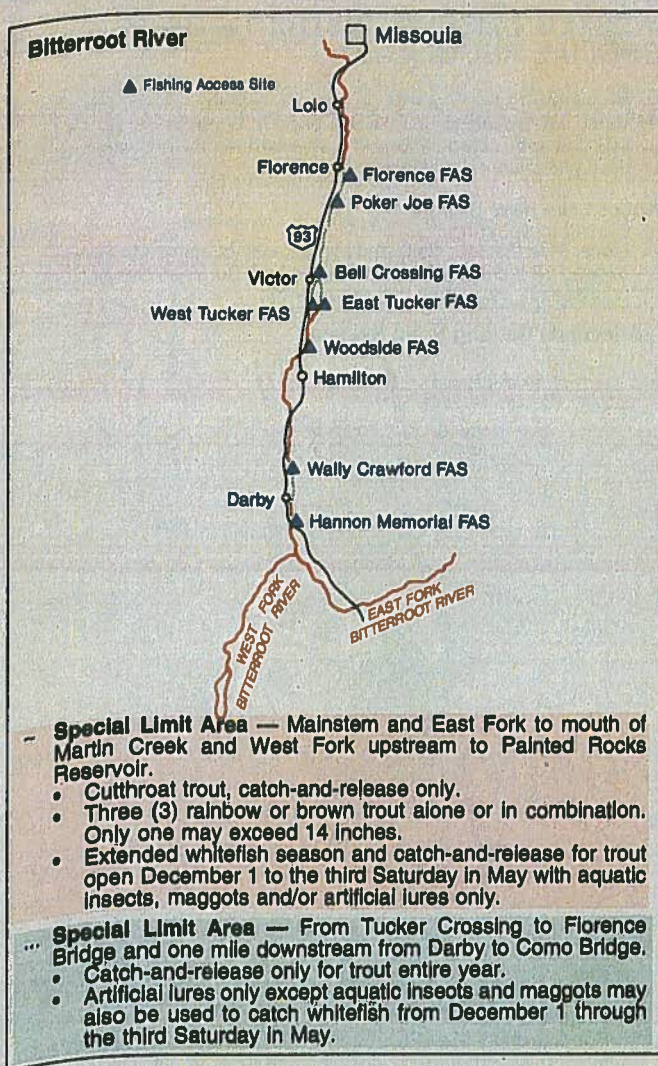
- All waters in the Wildlife Management Area upstream from Warm Springs Bridge — catch-and-release, artificial lures only.
- Hog Hole open May 25 through June 30.
- Pond 3 open May 25 through September 30 to fishing from floating non-motorized craft and from north and west dikes except where posted closed.
- All ponds and canals open August 15 through September 30.
- Willow Creek from Stewart Street Bridge to Wildlife Management Area boundary — catch-and-release, artificial lures only.

#### Ashley Creek downstream from Smith Lake

- Open entire year.
- Ashley Creek from Thompson Falls public water supply intake to source**
- Closed entire year.
- Ashley Lake**
- Limit: 35 salmon daily and 70 in possession.
- Ashley Lake Inlet Tributaries**
- Closed entire year.
- Basin Creek from lower Butte water supply reservoir dam to source, including all reservoirs and tributaries**
- Closed entire year.
- Big Creek (North Fork Flathead tributary) and all tributaries**
- Closed entire year.



## WESTERN FISHING DISTRICT



**Bitterroot Valley between U.S. 93 and the East Side Highway between Hamilton and Buckhouse Bridge (ditches, canals and sloughs)**

- Extended northern pike and whitefish season and catch-and-release for trout open December 1 to the third Saturday in May with aquatic insects, maggots, and/or artificial lures only.

### Blackfoot River

- Mainstem and all tributaries (except Clearwater River downstream from Lake Inez fish barrier).
- Limit A: Rainbow and brown trout, three (3) fish, none of which may exceed 12 inches. Cutthroat trout, catch-and-release only.
- Extended whitefish season and catch-and-release for trout open December 1 to the third Saturday in May with aquatic insects, maggots, and/or artificial lures only.

### Blanchard Lake near Whitefish

- Open to spearing or gigging of northern pike and nongame fish through the ice and by persons submerged in the water.

### Blue Sky Creek (Kootenai Drainage)

- Open third Saturday in May through July 15.

## WESTERN FISHING DISTRICT

### Bootjack Lake (near Whitefish, T31N, R23W, S26)

- Open April 1 through November 30.
- Limit A: One (1) trout daily and in possession, minimum size limit 22 inches, artificial lures only.

### Brenneman Slough

- Closed entire year to taking of salmon.

### Cedar Creek Impoundment (Columbia Falls water supply)

- Closed entire year.

### Church Slough (Flathead River)

- Open year around.
- Limit: Five (5) bass daily and in possession, only one of which may exceed 12 inches. May 15 through June 30; one bass daily and in possession; 22 inches minimum.
- Closed to spearing.

### Clarence Creek (Kootenai Drainage)

- Open third Saturday in May through July 15.

### Clark Fork River

- Anaconda Company Settling No. 2 Pond spillway to Perkins Lane Bridge
  - Limit A: Five (5) trout under 12 inches or 4 trout under 12 inches and 1 over 20 inches, artificial lures only.
- Milltown Dam to mouth of Thompson River
  - Limit A: Five (5) trout, only one of which may exceed 16 inches.
- Anaconda Company Settling Pond No. 2 spillway (near Warm Springs) to mouth of Thompson River
  - Extended whitefish season and catch-and-release for trout open December 1 to the third Saturday in May with aquatic insects, maggots, and/or artificial lures only.
- Mouth of Flathead River to mouth of Thompson River
  - Open entire year for northern pike with bait or lures.
- Mouth of Thompson River to Idaho Border
  - Open entire year. Lake limits apply to entire reach.

### Clearwater Drainage

- Upstream from Lake Inez fish barrier and all tributaries of the Clearwater River
  - Limit A: Rainbow and brown trout, 3 fish, none of which may exceed 12 inches. Catch-and-release only for cutthroat trout.
- Downstream from Lake Inez fish barrier

- Limit: Five (5) trout (including brook trout).

### Echo Lake near Bigfork

- Limit: Five (5) bass daily and in possession, only one of which may exceed 12 inches. May 15 through June 30; one bass daily and in possession, 22 inches minimum.
- Closed to spearing, except open to spearing and gigging of nongame fish and northern pike through ice.

### Elk Creek, tributary to Swan River

- Closed entire year.

### Emily Springs, tributary to Georgetown Lake

- Open July 1 through November 30.
- Limit for all trout, including brook trout, is 5.

### Fennon Slough (Flathead River)

- Open year around.
- Limit: Five (5) bass daily and in possession, only one may exceed 12 inches.

### Fisher River

- Extended whitefish season and catch-and-release for trout open December 1 to the third Saturday in May with aquatic insects, maggots, and/or artificial lures.

#### Flower Creek and its artificial impoundments from Power Dam to its source, excluding natural lakes

- Closed entire year.

#### Fred Burr Lake (Philipsburg water supply, Granite County)

- Closed entire year.

#### Freeland Creek Drainage, tributary to Lake Mary Ronan

- Closed entire year.

#### Georgetown Lake

- Lake open third Saturday in May through March 31 except:
  - The south and east shoreline is closed to fishing from the shore or within 100 yards of the shore from April 1 to July 1. The closed area extends from a point 200 yards west of the Denton's Point Marina, easterly and northerly along the shore including Stuart Mill Bay in its entirety, to a point 200 yards north of the mouth of the North Fork Flint Creek.
  - Tributaries to Georgetown Lake (North Fork Flint Creek, Stuart Mill Creek, Hardtia Creek and Emily Springs) open July 1 through November 30.
- Limit for all trout, including brook trout, is 5.
- No daily or possession limit for salmon.
- Closed to snagging.
- It is illegal to use or capture live bait fish except sculpins (*Cottus*).
- Goat Creek (Swan River tributary)
  - Closed entire year.
- Granite Creek (Middle Fork Flathead River tributary) and its tributaries
  - Closed entire year.

### Hardtia Creek, tributary to Georgetown Lake

- Open July 1 through November 30.
- Limit for all trout, including brook trout, is 5.

### Haskill Creek and tributaries from Whitefish public water intake to its source

- Closed entire year

- Closed entire year.

### Horseshoe Lake near Ferndale

- Closed to spearing.
- Five (5) bass under 12 inches or four bass under 12 inches and one over 16 inches.

### Hungry Horse Reservoir

- The daily and possession limit for bull trout is one fish. An angler must either release or kill immediately all bull trout caught. It is unlawful to possess a live bull trout.

- Open entire year, except Libby Dam to Highway 37 Bridge (Fisher River) is closed to fishing March 15 to third Saturday in May.

  - Three (3) trout under 13 inches and one over 18 inches

### Lake Alva

- Limit: Ten (10) salmon daily and in possession.

### Lake Blaine near Kalispell

- Closed to spearing.

### Lake Inez

- Limit: Ten (10) salmon daily and in possession.

### Lake Kootenai

- Closed to burbot (ling) fishing January 15 through February 28.

### Lake Mary Ronan

- Open third Saturday in May through February 28.
- May 15 through June 30; one bass daily and in possession, 22 inches minimum length.
- Limit: Ten (10) salmon daily and 20 in possession.
- Closed to salmon snagging.
- Closed to spearing.

### Libby Creek

- Extended whitefish season and catch-and-release for trout open December 1 to the third Saturday in May with aquatic insects, maggots, and/or artificial lures only.

### Libby Dam (also see Kootenai River)

- Fishing from boats or other floating craft is prohibited in Kootenai River from Libby Dam approximately 500 yards downstream to David Thompson Bridge as posted.
- Structure as posted and the buoyed area immediately upstream from spillway
  - Closed entire year.

### Lion Creek tributary to Swan River

- Closed entire year.

### Little Bitterroot Lake

- Limit A: Ten (10) trout, only 1 over 22 inches.

### Little Blackfoot River

- Extended whitefish season and catch-and-release for trout open December 1 to the third Saturday in May with aquatic insects, maggots, and/or artificial lures only.

### Lodgepole Creek (Middle Fork Flathead River tributary) and its tributaries

- Closed entire year.

### Long Creek (Middle Fork Flathead River tributary) and its tributaries

- Closed entire year.

### Swan River

- Piper Creek Bridge downstream to Swan Lake
  - Limit A: Catch-and-release for rainbow and cutthroat trout, artificial lures only.

- Open third Saturday in May through July 15.

### Whale Creek (North Fork Flathead tributary) and its tributaries downstream from Whale Creek Falls

- Closed entire year.

### Whitefish Lake

- Closed entire year to snagging of salmon. Limit: Ten (10) salmon daily and 20 in possession.
- Ten (10) lake trout under 30 inches or 9 lake trout under 30 inches and 1 over 36 inches may be kept in addition to other species in Limit A.
- Limit: 50 lake whitefish.

### Whitefish River from Whitefish Lake to Montana State Highway 40 bridge

- Open entire year.

### Wigwam River (Kootenai Drainage)

- Catch-and-release only for all trout, artificial lures only.

### Wildlife Management Ponds

- See "Job Corps Ponds"

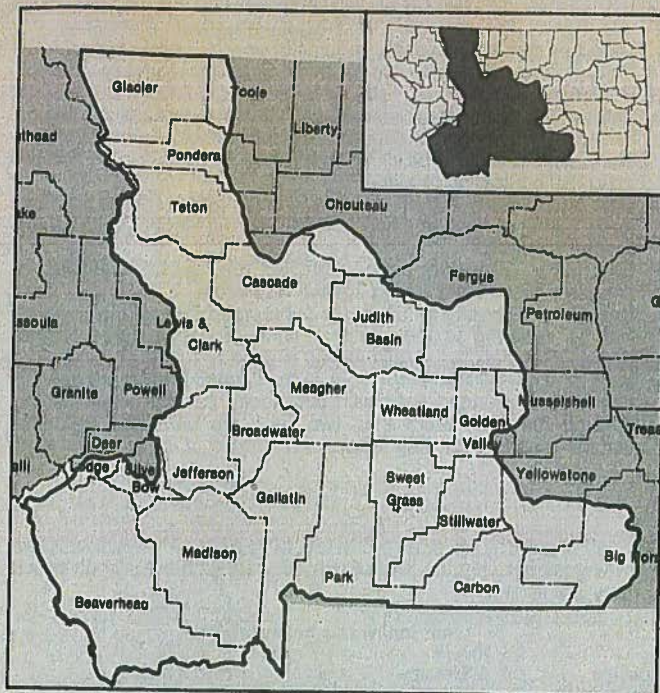
### Willow Creek (near Anaconda Settling Ponds)

- From Stewart Street Bridge to Wildlife Management Area
  - catch-and-release only; artificial lures only.

### Woods Lake

- Open April 1 through November 30.
- Limit A: One (1) trout daily and in possession, size must exceed 22 inches, artificial lures only.

**Central Fishing District includes all waters in Montana lying East of the Continental Divide, (including the Belly and St Marys Drainages) and waters lying West of the following described boundary:**

Interstate 15 from the Montana-Canadian border south to Northwest Bypass Junction near Great Falls, then east on said Bypass to Smelter Avenue, then east on Smelter Avenue to 15th Street, then south on said street to north bank of Missouri River, then east along high water mark of the Missouri River to Black Eagle Dam, then across said dam and following high water mark along the south bank of the Missouri River, then easterly to State Route 80 at Fort Benton; then southeasterly along State Route 80 to its junction with State Route 81, then easterly on State Route 81 to its junction with U.S. Highway 191, then northeasterly along U.S. Highway 191 to its junction with State Route 19, then south on State Route 19 to its junction with U.S. Highway 87, then south on U.S. Highway 87 to its junction with U.S. Highway 12, then west on U.S. Highway 12 to its junction with State Route 3, then south on State Route 3 to its junction with Interstate 90, then easterly and southerly on Interstate 90 to the first crossing of the Little Bighorn River, then southerly along the west bank of the Little Bighorn River to the Montana-Wyoming border.

## Standard Fishing Seasons

**Lakes**—Open entire year.

**Rivers and Streams**—Open third Saturday in May through November 30.

**Setlines**—Anglers may use setlines in those waters open to setline fishing as specified under Special Regulations. Unattended setlines must be clearly identified with owner's complete name and address. Valid fishing license required.

**Bow and Arrow**—All waters open to angling are open to bow and arrow taking of nongame fish. Crossbows are illegal. Valid fishing license required.

**Snagging**—All waters open to angling are open to snagging of nongame fish. Valid fishing license required.

**Spearing**—Persons swimming or submerged may take nongame fish by spearing in most waters open to fishing (note District Special Regulations). Valid fishing license required.

**Ice Fishing**—All lakes-reservoirs in the Central District are open to use of two attended lines with two hooks per line when fishing through the ice. More than two lines are permitted on some waters—see Special Regulations.

The maximum weight sturgeon (genus *Scaphirhynchus*) which may be taken is 16 pounds. It is unlawful to take or possess a Pallid Sturgeon (*Scaphirhynchus albus*) of any size.

## Bait (Live)

- Live fish may not be imported into or exported from the State of Montana except by permit issued by the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.
- Sculpins (genus *Cottus*) may be used for live bait in all waters of the Central District except in waters limited to artificial lures and the Madison River between Varney Bridge and Ennis Lake.
- Live nongame fish (except carp, goldfish, sunfish, bullheads (catfish family), yellow perch and rainbow smelt) may be used for bait only in the following waters:
  - Bighorn Lake and Afterbay Reservoir.
  - Bighorn River—Afterbay Dam to cable 600 feet downstream and below Bighorn Access Area.
  - Clarks Fork Yellowstone River—downstream from bridge at Bridger.
  - Marias River.
  - Muddy Creek Drainage near Vaughn including all streams and drainage canals.
  - Streams and ditches in the Yellowstone River Drainage downstream of the mouth of the Clarks Fork (except for a section of the Bighorn River).

## Boat and Motor Restrictions

The use of boats and motors may be restricted on some of the waters within this fishing district. Please refer to the boat and motor restrictions described on page 37. A complete description of all the boat and motor restrictions can be obtained by contacting a license agent or any Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office.

## Standard Fishing Seasons

**All waters open entire year.**

**Setlines**—All lakes open to fishing are open to setline fishing through the ice only, except as specified under special regulations. Setlines shall not be attached to jugs or other floating devices. Valid fishing license required.

**All streams in Yellowstone Drainage open entire year to setlines.**

Anglers may use up to six (6) setlines with up to six (6) hooks per line in those waters open to setline fishing except as specified under special regulations.

Unattended setlines must be clearly identified with owner's complete name and address.

**Bow and Arrow**—All waters open to angling are open to bow and arrow taking of paddlefish and nongame fish. Crossbows are illegal. Valid fishing license required.

## EASTERN FISHING DISTRICT

**Snagging**—All waters open to angling are open to snagging of paddlefish. Snagging of chinook salmon is allowed on Fort Peck Reservoir from October 1 through November 30. All waters open to angling are open to snagging of nongame fish except the Missouri River and portions of the Yellowstone River, as specified under Special Regulations. Valid fishing license required.

**Spearing**—In all waters open to fishing non-game fish and burbot (ling) may be taken with rubber or spring-propelled spears by persons swimming or submerged. Valid fishing license required.

Spears or gigs may be used through the ice only for northern pike, walleye, sauger, burbot (ling) and nongame fish.

There is no limit on whitefish, cisco, and nongame fish. The maximum weight sturgeon (genus *Scaphirhynchus*) which may be taken is 16 pounds. It is unlawful to take or possess a pallid sturgeon (*Scaphirhynchus albus*) of any size.

## Hoop Nets

- The use of hoop nets is permitted in certain areas of the Eastern Fishing District.
- A permit is required.
- The use of hoop nets is limited to licensed resident anglers.
- Permit applications and rules are available in the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks offices in Glasgow and Miles City.



**Bait (Live)**

- Live fish may not be imported into or exported from the State of Montana except by permit issued by the Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks.

  - Closed to use of live fish for bait except sculpins.
- Upstream from Fresno Reservoir (above Goldstone Bridge)
  - Open entire year to setlines.
- And its impoundments downstream from Fresno Dam
  - Open entire year to setlines.

### Missouri River

- Upstream from Morony Dam
  - Closed to use of live fish for bait except sculpins.
- Immediately downstream from Morony Dam as posted
  - Closed entire year.
- Downstream from Morony Dam (excluding river and dredge cuts between Fort Peck Dam and mouth of Milk River)
  - Open entire year to setlines.
- From Fort Peck Dam to mouth of Milk River (including Dredge Cut Ponds)
  - Open entire year for up to two (2) setlines with no more than two (2) hooks per line except up to six (6) setlines with six (6) hooks per line may be used to fish through ice.
  - Limit A: Not to include more than two (2) rainbow trout.
- Downstream from outlet tunnels of Fort Peck Dam as posted
  - Closed entire year.
- Downstream from Fort Peck Dam near Duck Island as posted
  - Closed March 1 through July 31 to fishing and wading.
- Morony Dam downstream to North Dakota border
  - It is illegal to snag for nongame fish.
- **Paddlefish Regulations — Missouri River (upstream of Fort Peck Dam)**
  - All paddlefish anglers, regardless of age, must purchase and have in their possession paddlefish tags in addition to other licenses that may be required.
  - Limit: two fish per season.
  - Each paddlefish angler must cast for and hook his or her own fish. It is unlawful to cast for and/or hook a paddlefish for another person.
  - Any paddlefish tag that is locked shut prior to attachment to a fish shall be void.
  - Any tag which has been altered or modified shall be void.
  - It is unlawful to possess an untagged paddlefish or parts thereof. Anglers must tag paddlefish with their own tag.
  - Paddlefish anglers must either tag or release a paddlefish immediately when taken.
  - If a fish is cut up, the angler must keep that portion of the back and dorsal fin (back fin) necessary to maintain the tag sealed to the fish.
  - It is illegal to snag for nongame fish from the Morony Dam downstream to the North Dakota border.
- **Paddlefish Regulations — Missouri River (downstream of Fort Peck Dam)**
  - Regulations for this body of water are those listed under paddlefish regulations. See Yellowstone River and Missouri River downstream of Fort Peck Dam, page 35.

### Musselshell River

- Open entire year to setlines.

## EASTERN FISHING DISTRICT

### Nelson Reservoir (Phillips County)

- Open entire year for up to two (2) setlines with no more than two (2) hooks per line, except that up to six (6) setlines with six (6) hooks per line may be used to fish through ice.
- Open entire year for all species to persons swimming or submerged using rubber or spring-propelled spears.
- Limit: No number limit on northern pike.

### Peoples Creek

- South of Highway 2 (Bears Paw Mountains)
  - Open third Saturday in May through November 30.
  - Closed to use of live fish for bait except sculpins.

### Poplar River

- Open entire year to setlines.

### Powder River and tributaries

- Open entire year to bow and arrow taking of catfish. Crossbows are illegal.

### Redwater River

- Open entire year to setlines.

### Ross Reservoir (Blaine County)

- Open third Saturday in May through November 30.
- Limit A: Five (5) trout.

### Rush Hall Pond (Fallon County)

- Open February 1 through October 15.

### Snake Creek (Bears Paw Mountains)

- Open third Saturday in May through November 30.
- Closed to use of live fish for bait except sculpins.

### Sucker Creek (Bears Paw Mountains)

- Open third Saturday in May through November 30.
- Closed to use of live fish for bait except sculpins.

### Teton River

- Open entire year to setlines.

### Tiber Reservoir (Lake Elwell)

- Open entire year to fishing with two (2) lines with two (2) hooks per line except that up to six (6) lines with six (6) hooks per line may be used to fish through ice.
- Limit: Ten (10) northern pike daily and in possession.

### Tongue River Reservoir

- Open entire year for all species to persons swimming or submerged using rubber or spring-propelled spears.
- Up to six (6) lines with six (6) hooks per line may be used to fish through ice but the angler must be in the vicinity and within visual contact of the line(s) or rod(s) at all times.

### Wind Creek (Blaine County) from Clear Creek road crossing to its sources, excluding Ross Reservoir

- Closed entire year.

### Yellowstone River

- Downstream from mouth of Cottonwood Creek (approximately 4 miles downstream of Intake Diversion Dam)
  - Open May 1 through June 30 to snagging of paddlefish or as posted. Snagging of nongame fish prohibited.
- From mouth of Bighorn River to mouth of Cottonwood Creek (approximately 4 miles downstream of Intake Diversion Dam)
  - Open May 15 through June 30 to snagging of paddlefish or as posted. Snagging of nongame fish prohibited.
- From Intake Diversion to about 1/4 mile downstream as posted
  - Closed May 15 through June 30 to fishing or snagging from boats or as posted.

### **Yellowstone River, Continued...**

- **Paddlefish Regulations — Yellowstone River and Missouri River (downstream of Fort Peck Dam)**
  - All paddlefish anglers regardless of age, must purchase and have in their possession paddlefish tags in addition to other licenses that may be required.
  - Limit: one fish per season.
  - Each paddlefish angler must cast for and hook his or her own fish. It is unlawful to cast for and/or hook a paddlefish for another person.
  - Any paddlefish tag that is locked shut prior to attachment to a fish shall be void.
  - Any tag which has been altered or modified shall be void.
  - It is unlawful to possess an untagged paddlefish or parts thereof. Anglers must tag paddlefish with their own tag.
  - For the Yellowstone River only — it is unlawful to release a paddlefish. Each paddlefish must be immediately tagged when caught.
  - If a fish is cut up, the angler must keep that portion of the back and dorsal fin (back fin) necessary to maintain the tag sealed to the fish.

### **Montana Stream Access Law**

Under the Montana Stream Access Law, rivers and streams capable of recreational use may be so used by the public up to the ordinary high water marks. Although Montana law gives recreationists the right to pursue water-based recreational activities within the high water marks of rivers and streams, it does not give recreationists the right to enter posted lands bordering those streams or to cross private lands to gain access to streams.

The success or failure of the law hinges on the behavior of landowners and recreationists. We emphasize the need for cooperation and mutual respect.

Recreationists are urged to obtain more detailed information from any Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office.

### **Montana Trespass Law**

Montana's trespass law states that a member of the public has the privilege to enter or remain on private land by the explicit permission of the landowner or his agent, or by the failure of the landowner to post notice denying entry onto the land.

It is the responsibility of the recreationist to determine whether private lands are posted. If lands are posted, it is the recreationist's responsibility to obtain permission from landowners before recreating on these lands. Recreationists are urged to obtain more detailed information from any Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office.

## GENERAL REGULATIONS

### **Indian Reservations**

- Certain waters on Indian Reservations may have special rules. Tribal permits may be required. Specific information should be obtained from reservation headquarters.
- The State of Montana and Confederated Salish and Kootenai Tribes have entered into a cooperative agreement on the Flathead Reservation. Please check for fishing regulations specific to the Flathead Reservation. For information call the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks at 752-5501 or the Tribes at 675-2700.

### **National Parks**

Certain waters on National Parks may have special rules. Specific information may be obtained from the headquarters of the park.

### **Wildlife Refuges**

Certain waters on Wildlife Refuges may have special rules. Specific information may be obtained from the headquarters of the refuge involved.

### **Ice Fishing**

- **Number of Rods/Lines**
  - Two rods and/or lines may be used to fish through ice on all lakes, reservoirs, or ponds in the Western and Central Districts and six rods and/or lines may be used to fish through ice on lakes, reservoirs, and ponds in the Eastern District. See Special Regulations for exceptions.
- **Size of Hole**
  - The maximum size hole that may be cut for ice fishing is 144 square inches.
  - There is no limit on the size of hole used for fishing with a spear or gig.
- **Shelters**
  - The following special regulations apply to ice fishing shelters on the following waters:
    - Bearpaw Lake
    - Beaver Creek Reservoir
    - Browns Lake (near Ovando)
    - Deadmans Basin Reservoir
    - Echo Lake (near Anaconda)
    - Georgetown Lake
    - Hauser Lake
    - Helena Valley Reservoir
    - Lake Frances
    - Lake Helena
  - **Shelter definition:** Any hut or shelter constructed of any material except ice or snow.
  - **Shelter identification:** Each shelter must be marked with the owner's name, address, and/or phone number, painted or permanently affixed to the shelter in legible letters not less than two (2) inches in height, of contrasting color to the background, and plainly visible at a distance of 100 feet.
  - **Inspection:** Each shelter of closed type construction shall have a door readily opened from the outside for inspection by an officer when the shelter is occupied. The door shall not be latched from the inside.
  - **Use:** It is prohibited for any person to use, fish from or occupy an ice fishing shelter if the shelter does not conform to the rules.
- **Shelter removal**
  - Daily removal is required on the following waters:
    - Browns Lake (near Ovando)
    - Georgetown Lake
    - Deadmans Basin
    - Echo Lake (near Anaconda)
    - Fitzpatrick Lake
    - Helena Valley Reservoir
  - On Hauser Lake and Lake Helena ice fishing shelters may not be set on the ice until after sunrise and must be removed from the area before sunset each day.

### Ice Fishing, Continued...

- Removal after season: The owner of an ice fishing shelter shall remove the shelter from the area and from public property before it becomes irretrievable over the ice.
- Waste and rubbish disposal: It is the responsibility of the owner and users of ice fishing shelters to keep the immediate area around their shelter free from rubbish and trash. Waste material must be removed when the angler leaves for the day.

### Crayfish

- Crayfish may be taken for personal use with a net or screen not to exceed four (4) feet in length or width, by hook and line, or in traps not exceeding 18 inches in length and 10 inches in width or diameter. A valid fishing license is required.
- The collection of crayfish for sale or commercial distribution requires a permit. Contact a Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office for information.

### Commercial Whitefish Fishing

- A permit is required to sell whitefish. Contact Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks regional office for a permit and a list of waters open to commercial harvest of whitefish.

### Mussels

In accordance with ARM Sec. 12.5.301 it is unlawful to take or possess freshwater mussels or their shells.

### Check Stations

- Anglers and hunters are required to stop as directed at all designated check stations on their way to and from fishing and hunting areas, even if there are no fish or game to be checked.

### Boat and Motor Restrictions

- The use of boats is prohibited or restricted on many waters. A copy of the **Boating Laws and Rules** is available from any Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks office.
- Notice: When using any form of a raft, boat, or sailboat on Montana's waters, a personal flotation device (PFD) must be made available for all persons on board. The PFD must be the appropriate size, be in good working order and readily available to each person, and be U.S. Coast Guard approved. Boats 16 feet and longer must have an additional throwable Type IV PFD on board.
- All youth under the age of 12 must wear (securely fastened to their body) a PFD at all times when in a boat that is less than 26 feet and in motion.
- The following is a partial list of rules pertaining to boating and water safety; other waters may be closed as posted.

#### It Is Unlawful

- To operate upon Montana waters:
  - All motorboats (gas or electric) and sailboats 12 feet long and longer must be properly licensed and numbered with registration carried on board.
  - All boats must carry equipment as required by the **Montana Boating Laws and Rules**.

### It Is Unlawful, Continued...

- Youth 12 years of age and under may not operate a motorboat with a motor greater than 10 horsepower unless an adult is on board.
- Unless an adult is on board, youth 13 and 14 years of age must possess a Montana motorboat operator's certificate or proof of completing an approved course in order to operate a motorboat with a motor greater than 10 horsepower.

### Boating Closures

- **12.6.801 (1)** The following waters/areas will be either closed as posted or marked by barrel booms to the use of all boats or other water craft except in case of rescue craft or plant maintenance work:
  - (a) area immediately above and below Canyon Ferry Dam in Lewis and Clark County;
  - (b) area immediately above Kerr Dam in Lake County;
  - (c) a portion of Brown's Lake near Ovando, Powell County, during the time period beginning April 1 and ending July 15.
- All rivers and streams in the following counties east of the Continental Divide are closed to the use of all boats propelled by machinery of over 10 horsepower, except for official use:

### Releasing Fish

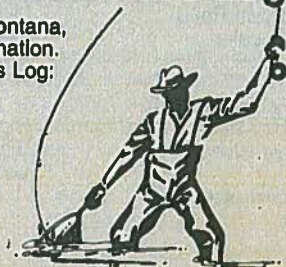
To ensure a released fish has the best chance for survival:

- Play the fish as rapidly as possible — do not play it to total exhaustion.
- Keep the fish in water as much as possible when handling and removing a hook.
- Remove the hook gently — do not squeeze the fish or put fingers in its gills.
- If deeply hooked, cut the line. Do not yank the hook out. Most fish survive with hooks left in them.
- Release the fish only after its equilibrium is maintained. If necessary, gently hold the fish upright facing upstream and move it slowly back and forth.
- Release the fish in quiet water close to the area where it was hooked.

## HELP PROTECT THE PALLID STURGEON!



The **Pallid Sturgeon** is a fish of special concern in Montana and it is listed as an Endangered Species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Pallids are a bottom-dwelling fish of the Missouri and Yellowstone rivers, preferring strong currents flowing over a sandy or gravelly river bottom.

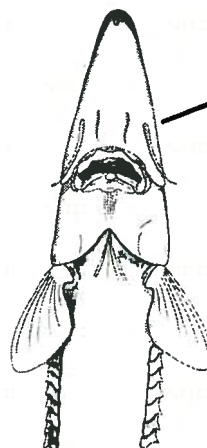
Montana law requires:

- All pallid sturgeon must be released immediately.
- All sturgeon heavier than 16 pounds must be released immediately.

What can you do to help conserve the Pallid Sturgeon?

1. Learn to distinguish the **Pallid** from the Shovelnose Sturgeon, a smaller and more common species (see diagrams below). Since the sturgeon are hard to identify, we recommend that all sturgeon be released if you are unsure of the species.
2. Immediately and safely release the **Pallid Sturgeon**.
3. Contact the Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks with any information on the location and size of **Pallid Sturgeon**.

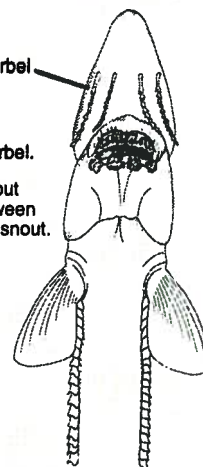
Outer Barbel

2. Barbels attached about 1/2 the distance between the mouth and tip of snout.



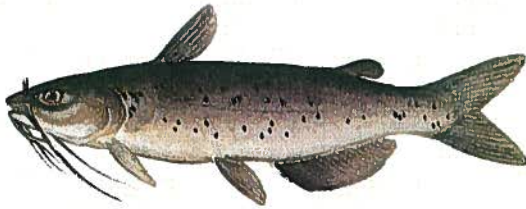
