
# MONTANA FISH, WILDLIFE & PARKS LAW ENFORCEMENT DIVISION







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Dear Director Williams and the Citizens of Montana,

The following pages provide an overview of the Law Enforcement Division's accomplishments over the last year. Not only did 2017 bring significant obstacles and challenges for the division, it also demonstrated the resolve, determination and flexibility of Montana Game Wardens to adapt to and overcome those challenges. This annual report serves to capture and present that information.

The detection of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) in Canyon Ferry and Tiber Reservoirs was the first of many new challenges. Game Wardens seamlessly adjusted to the new emphasis on AIS detection efforts, AIS inspection stations and AIS decontamination stations across the state. This critical work will continue to be a challenge as well as a priority for not only for the Enforcement Division but for the entire agency.

The recent discovery of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in Montana has now set the stage for our latest challenge. The enforcement division has and will continue to dedicate hundreds of hours programmatically coordinating CWD hunts, facilitating and leading sample collection, organizing checkstations and working with landowners, hunters, and other stakeholders for the foreseeable future as the prevalence of CWD is determined.

Perhaps the biggest challenge for the Enforcement Division however, has been the Pittman-Robertson (P-R) funding of personal services (pay). The 2017 legislature funded the division with 30% P-R funds; as opposed to 3 to 9% in previous years. P-R funds are strictly prohibited from being used for law enforcement duties. As such, Game Warden efforts dedicated to proactive conservation law enforcement, state parks enforcement, water safety enforcement and criminal investigation of poaching activity in Montana were drastically impacted.

Arguably, one of the most dangerous jobs in law enforcement is that of a Game Warden. We work alone, without close back up, in areas with limited communication and nearly everyone we encounter is armed. Despite the dangers, risks and hazards of protecting our wild resources and the challenges AIS, legislative Pittman-Robertson funding and CWD has presented, Montana's Game Wardens commitment and dedication to the mission of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks continues strong and unwavering in serving and protecting Montana, The Last Best Place.

# GAME WARDEN CONTANT OF THE STATE OF THE STAT

#### **OATH OF OFFICE**

I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support, protect and defend the constitution of the United States and the constitution of the state of Montana and that I will discharge the duties of my office as a Fish, Wildlife and Parks Game Warden with fidelity (so help me God).

#### LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession: Law Enforcement.







## Law Enforcement **Division Priorities**

#### **OFFICER SAFETY**

Our most important resource is our personnel. In 2017, 129 law enforcement officers nationwide were killed in the line of duty, 45 of whom were feloniously killed in the line of duty-including Montana's Broadwater County, Deputy Mason Moore. The safety of Montana's Game Wardens has been and will continue to be a priority for the agency and the division. An aggressive training program where safety, proficiency, skill and knowledge are a common theme will continue within the division. Training and implementation of best practices and procedures that keep Game Wardens safe while at the same time keeping conservation law enforcement relevant and on the cutting edge of technology will continue to be emphasized as we move forward.

#### RESOURCE PROTECTION

Wildlife crime worldwide continues at an epidemic rate. The mission of Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks places the protection and preservation of our wild resources as an agency wide priority and the underlying foundation for the work we do. Through proactive law enforcement and sound professional criminal investigations, Montana's Game Wardens are dedicated to the protection and preservation of Montana's priceless fish, wildlife and parks resources and providing for safe recreational opportunities. Public involvement with resource protection through the promotion and use of TIPMONT will continue to be an emphasis within the law enforcement program.

#### **PUBLIC SERVICE**

Public trust, professionalism and conduct are the foundational tenets upon which our Oath of Office and the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics are built. As public employees, the Game Wardens of the Enforcement Division are committed to upholding and demonstrating this by continuing to deliver fair, consistent and impartial law enforcement without compromising officer safety or weakening officer discretion.



#### **PARTNERSHIPS**

Game Wardens are more often the face and voice representing Fish, Wildlife & Parks in our local communities. Continuing to grow and strengthen existing relationships while developing critical new relationships with sportsmen and women, constituency groups, landowners and all Montanans has been a traditional strength of Montana Game Wardens and will continue as we strive to meet the challenges of an everchanging and evolving landscape.

#### **TECHNOLOGY**

The use of technology clearly plays an increasingly important role in nearly all aspects of modern law enforcement. The enforcement division will continue to explore employ and leverage technology to our advantage to streamline administrative tasks, enhance officer safety, collect relevant enforcement data and enable more efficient use of time.

#### **POLICY DEVELOPMENT**

Up-to-date, defendable, enforceable and reliable policy in a 'develop, implement, review and revise cycle' is integral in any law enforcement organization. The enforcement division will continue with consolidating and modernizing existing policy, developing needed policy and purging obsolete policy.

#### **OVERCOMING CHALLENGES**

The division will certainly continue to be faced with new and unforeseen challenges while at the same time being tasked with adapting to the AIS, CWD, and PR funding challenges we currently face. Increased public and agency demand on Game Warden time coupled with an everchanging work environment will require Montana Game Wardens to remain relevant, keep an eye to the future but never lose sight of our past.

# 2017 REPORT



## Fisheries/Fishing Access Site Enforcement

The Montana Department of Fish, Wildlife and Parks Enforcement Division enforces the laws and rules regulating fishing in the state of Montana through the use of effective, professional conservation law enforcement.

The 2017 legislature passed legislation expanding the FWP Aquatic invasive species (AIS) program in response to the discovery of invasive mussels in Montana. This discovery, changed the nature of FWP Warden's summer field work, putting a much larger emphasis on the AIS program. Wardens spend their time enforcing regulations in three main areas:

- 1. Enforcing regulations pertaining to AIS quarantine areas.
- 2. Enforcing mandatory inspection for traveling watercraft.
- 3. Enforcing mandatory inspection before launch for out of state boats.

Montana Game Wardens enforce the rules and laws regulating fishing in the state of Montana. Wardens patrol the field, contact anglers, check licenses and ensure compliance.

Additionally, the Fishing Access Site Program is part of the Fisheries division. Wardens patrol Fishing access sites, investigate crimes committed in the sites and insure users are following the regulations.

#### **Fishing Access Sites** at-a-glance:

- ▶ Montana has 336 fishing access
- ▶ Approximately 3.9 million people use a FAS annually. FAS are used for fishing, boating and other recreation
- ▶ Approximately 40.7% of FAS users do not purchase a fishing licenses

Wardens routinely patrol large districts contacting hunters/trappers and responding to complaints.

The enforcement division has a corps of dedicated criminal investigators whose duties are to investigate and help prosecute large wildlife crimes.

## Recreational Boating Safety Program

The Objective of the Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks Recreational Boating Safety Program is to save lives, reduce boating accidents, and to protect and enhance recreational boating opportunities for Montanans through the positive use of law enforcement and education.

#### **Boating Fatalities in Montana:**

- ▶ 136 people have died in boating accidents in Montana since 1998
- ▶ 67% of the fatalities occurred in accidents involving non-motorized watercraft
- ▶ 33% of the fatalities occurred in accidents involving motorized watercraft.
- ▶ 77% of the victims were male, 23% female.
- ▶ 61% of the fatalities were not wearing a PFD at the time of the accident
- ▶ The leading cause of death in Montana boating accidents is drowning at 88%
